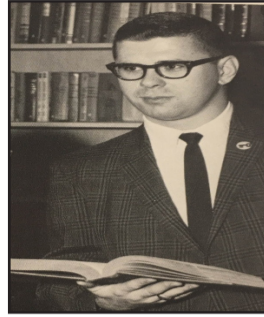

# Hubbard celebrates 50 years with Mr. Fitz

Mr. James Fitzgerald just celebrated his 50th year as a CPS teacher, all of them at Hubbard High School. Mr. Fitzgerald, better known as Mr. Fitz, currently teaches five law classes: four Law 1 and one Law 2. Depending on the research, anywhere from 27 to 50 percent of new teachers quit after their first year, and only a handful of teachers have taught at Hubbard for more than 30 years.

Many people are naturally curious how Mr. Fitz has managed to survive and thrive as a teacher for so long. It's such a momentous achievement that a WGN news crew came to Hubbard on May 21 to interview Mr. Fitz about his years of service and followed him throughout the school day. The piece will air on June 14 on the WGN evening news.

Mr. Fitz has seen many changes since he began teaching at Hubbard in

1967.

During the 60s, the food served to the students was freshly baked and homemade. Some of the major changes in the school were the length of the day and the length of the school year with class periods being 40 minutes long instead of the 50 we have now and the school year was two weeks shorter than it is now. The ACT was optional and it was given on a Saturday rather than being mandatory for every junior.

There were no IB or AP classes, but there were basic, regular and honors classes. The boys gym as well as the pool and the West lunchroom did not exist when he began teaching. The school only had 2,600 students. Juniors and seniors at Hubbard attended school from 6:30 am to 12:30 pm while freshmen and sophomores were scheduled from 10:30 am to 4:30 pm.

Mr. Fitz was offered jobs at other schools, but commuting seemed to be a deal breaker. The moment a job closer to home became available, he went for it and arrived at Hubbard. The school and neighborhood were primarily Lithuanian and almost everyone spoke Lithuanian.

The diversity of the neighborhood has changed over the years, which has led him to learn a little bit of Spanish. Mr. Fitz says the stu-

dents have not changed, but society has due to technology like cellphones and social media.

According to Mr. Fitz, all of the paperwork and the standardized testing that teachers are now required to do has taken some of the fun out of teaching. Mr. Fitz has taken students to Europe and Hawaii but those trips are now a thing of the past due to liability issues.

After 50 years of teaching, Mr. Fitz has considered retirement, but he says it really depends on whether he can physically keep teaching and, more importantly, if students continue to show interest in his class. If the school became all IB and there was no reason to have a law class, he would retire.

Mr. Fitz is proud to say that he has a large number of former students who went on to become judges, attorneys, paralegals, court reporters, police officers, FBI agents, and a high school principal.

## Rare Illinois Supreme Court case outside of Springfield highlight consequences of underaged sex and social media

On Thursday, May 19th the Illinois Supreme Court made a rare appearance outside the Supreme Court building in Springfield, Illinois when they held court for oral arguments at Benedictine University in Lisle.

I was the only CPS teacher invited to attend thanks to the excellent showing of the Hubbard Mock Trial team in the state competition. One of the two cases being argued was Case No. 119563, Illinois v. Minnis. The case involved a teen male sex offender who had illegal contact with a female under the age of 17 and failed to disclose his Facebook page to which he had made posts just before he registered with the police as a sex offender which he must do the rest of his life. He had uploaded a profile photo of himself to Facebook. The law requires sex offenders to register with the police all "Internet sites maintained by the sex offender or to which the sex offender has uploaded any content or posted any messages or information."

He appealed on the grounds that the state law was unconstitutional under the First Amendment. The Supreme Court heard arguments from both sides and will rule later in the year. If he loses the case, the teen will be found guilty of a Class 3 Felony and faces a year or more in a state prison. In Illinois it is illegal for anyone under the age of 17 to engage in sexual activity. If they are 17, their partner cannot be 5 years or more older than them. All young adults should be aware of this and the possible consequences that can result if the parents of the under aged individual decide to file charges. Also remember with DNA, they can now prove who the other person is and there doesn't need to be a pregnancy to find and use DNA.

Arguments on a civil case which will also be decided later this year. Witnessing an Appeals Trial is nothing like the trials we see on TV. No witnesses, no swearing in, just attorneys arguing their side of the case before the 7 judge Illinois Supreme Court or before the 9 member U.S. Supreme Court.



# Greyhounds fight against gun violence

**D**id you know you one person is killed every 2 hours and 29 minutes in the city of Chicago?

There have been many tragic deaths in our neighborhoods due to gun violence, whether it's murder, suicides, or unintentional shootings.

Mr. Boyd's classes have had a speaker, Dion McGill, come into their class two days per week. He has been giving information about the incidents that have been happening and what we could do as a group to help out.

According to the Handgun Violence Prevention website, on average, there are 7 adolescents killed per day in the US by firearms. All these deaths/homicides are being added to Mr. McGill's charts and showed to his students.

Not only does he give us facts but he tells us real stories of devastated families who've lost loved ones due to all the violence happening around us. He says, "You need to get them in their feelings first", then explain why we need to make a change and open other people's eyes to this situation.

Mr. McGill works with the Illinois Council Against Handgun Violence (ICHV) which was created about 40 years ago by a group of parents. The ICHV has been the oldest statewide organization to prevent gun violence.

Mr. McGill found out about the ICHV when he saw a job post online. He got more into it and found out it was a job where he got to move around a lot and meet new people. On top of that, he was going to be able to help make the city safer which sounded like a good job for him.

Before Mr. McGill learned about the ICHV organization, he also had some personal experience with gun violence. Mr. McGill's friend committed suicide by shooting herself and his cousin was killed in a drive-by.

Other than having lost loved ones, Mr. McGill has had experience with an actual firearm himself. He was in the military for 9 years including one in Afghanistan where he worked with firearms for a whole year and known as "The Gunner".

Mr. McGill was asked what actions will the students take to spread awareness. His answer was "It's up to the student's...". He planned for students to come up with their own ideas.

Other than the posters the students have made and are now being displayed all around the school, there are many more plans ahead of them. There will be groups of students writing a letter to the alderman, leaving chalk messages around the neighborhood, making a peace banner, and working with social media to spread the word.

This organization is open to the people who would like to volunteer and save lives. You can sign up to help out with ICHV events and work on projects.

"Take some time to know what's going on in your city," said Mr. McGill. It could open your eyes to the real world and understand why there are organizations like these trying to help us reduce the violence.



## One Summer Chicago

Mayor Rahm Emanuel's One Summer Chicago program brings together government institutions, community-based organizations, and companies to offer over 25,000 employment and internship opportunities to youth and young adults from ages 14 to 24. The application is online. There are NO paper applications. Make sure you are prepared. You will need your social security number, any type of I.D, and if you are younger than 16 you will need to obtain a work permit.

If you are eligible you will be contacted via phone or email. They will schedule an interview for you. If you are not contacted or offered an initial interview, you will be placed on a waitlist. You will be given the job fit for you based on your interview.

Having been able to work for this program has gave me confidence. Since it was my first job, I learned important things for an interview, the proper work attire, and how to work with people. Some available jobs choices include the unemployment center, tee-shirt workshop, day care centers, and culinary jobs, all located downtown. I was placed at the unemployment center located near Cicero. Although some people had a negative attitude because of the long wait it was easy overall. I had to help translate the application of appeal for people who did not know how to read English. Aside from working with computers I helped the manager fax papers, make copies, make phone calls, etc.

Mondays and Tuesdays, students meet at the school assigned to you. This is where you interact with other teens and have debates, learn how to manage finances, taxes, etc. The rest of the week you work on the job. Some students have morning shifts from 9am-1pm or afternoon shifts 1-5pm.

The One Summer Chicago program grants teens work experience. They become more engaged and bond closer with the community. They are more likely to complete high school, and further their education.

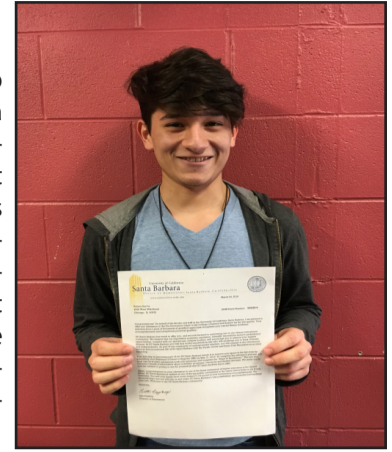

### Exercising

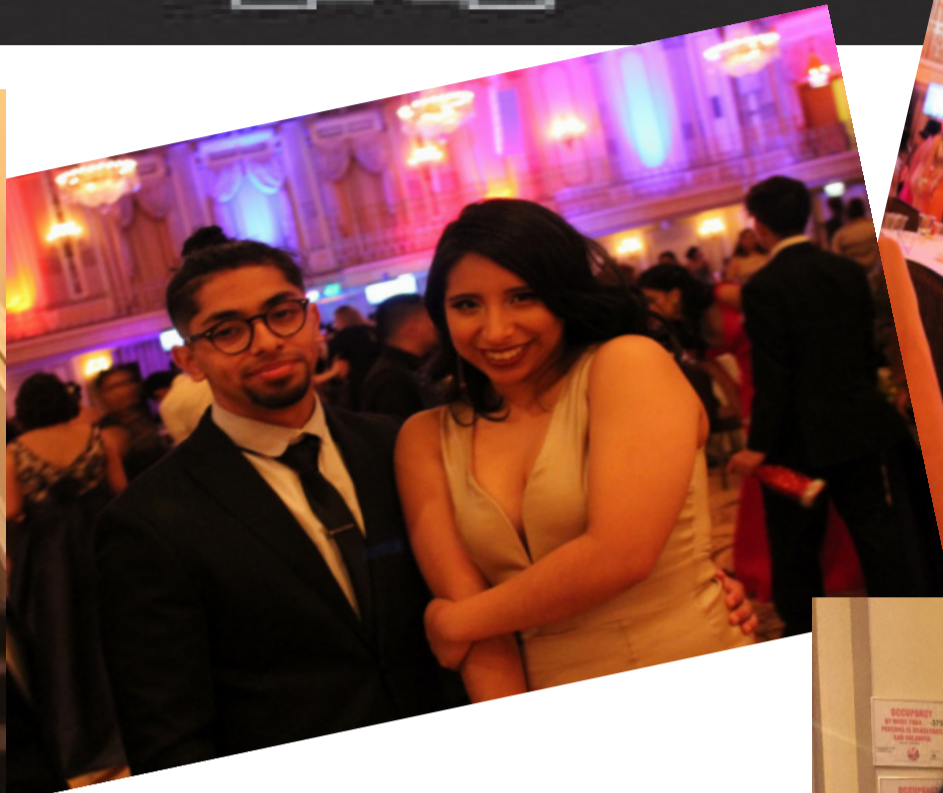
- Have a goal

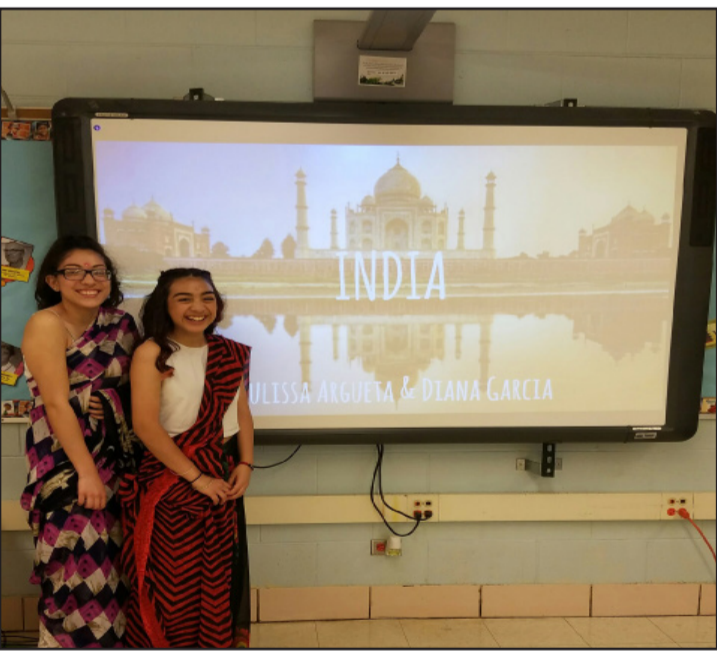


# International Day

## DC vs. Marvel There's no contest

Studios have to find the perfect middle ground to keep both longtime fans of these beloved characters happy and casual movie-going fans on the same page without alienating them.

Batman V. Superman: Dawn of Justice finally hit the big screen worldwide this past March. Announced way back at San Diego Comic-Con 2013, this movie went through the ringer for years. With backlash over casting choices, unstable release dates and rumors that this movie was only planned to compete with the Marvel Cinematic Universe it is fair to say that this movie was highly anticipated by almost everyone.

Let us not forget that BvS:DoJ was meant to be a sequel to 2013's Man of Steel but it felt like more of a superhero mash up instead. Zack Snyder had his hands full with this one, introducing the iconic Bruce Wayne/Batman and match him up with the Man of Steel and that itself seems like a whole movie in itself but the movie was tasked to be so much more than that.

Unfortunately the stuff that isn't related to the main story feels unnecessary in a movie that already is pushing two and a half hours. Fans of Wonder Woman wanted more of her, the introduction of the other Justice League members feels like an after-credit scene in the mess of the third act of the film, and probably the worst thing about the film is that all of the highlights can be found in the multiple trailers that this movie had. The film's title indicates that we are getting two movies in one but using Doomsday was possibly the worst thing that could have been revealed in the trailers but also what fans got was a watered down story line from the comic storyline, "The Death of Superman." Doomsday should have been saved for an actual solo Superman film but instead was wasted for some action shots and a reason to end the fight we were all looking forward to, Batman V. Superman.

Don't get me wrong. I didn't hate the movie. In fact, it does many things well, but the film probably would have worked better if there had been a solo Batman film beforehand. Despite early critics, Ben Affleck carried this movie on his shoulders. The way his origin story was handled to the way the fight scenes were filmed, it is almost like gameplay was ripped out of the Arkham games and put on the big screen.

It was uncanny how great Ben Affleck's Batman was handled. Jesse Eisenberg's Lex Luthor is an acquired taste, but I am interested to see where the series takes him.

Another thing everyone can appreciate are the visuals. Zack Snyder is a master at recreating comic images on the big screen. It had been his signature move since 2005's, Watchmen. BvS:DoJ falls short on many accounts but it's a decent starting point for the rest of DC's Cinematic Universe. Fans also have the director's cut to look forward to in hopes to redeem the film due in July.

While DC Studios is trying to fast track their Justice League franchise, Marvel Studios had their own showdown between Captain America and Iron Man with tension building up since 2012's The Avengers.

Captain America: Civil War is what BvS:DoJ should have been. A massive showdown between the two leading characters with interesting supporting characters subplots that further set up the entire storyline as a whole. Both films followed a similar format but Marvel Studios handled it better.

While Wonder Woman was great in BvS, her presence doesn't do much to further the story whereas the introduction of Black Panther and Spider-Man not only further the plot, but their presence make sense and aid the movie visually in recreating the Civil War storyline on the big screen.

Choosing sides in BvS was more based off which was your favorite. Civil War has similar elements but by the end of the story, you realize that both sides have good points. As an avid Iron Man fan, I understand why Captain America would choose to go against him. Marvel Studios does a great job setting up the timeline when it comes to their films. Civil War feels like the kind of movie that changes the events of the franchise while BvS feels like more of a pissing match that won't have much of an effect on the rest of the franchise.

Captain America: Civil War is filled with a Giant Man-sized cast, but everyone has their time to shine. Marvel Studios does a great job when it comes to their casting. Robert Downey, Jr was born to play Tony Stark and Chris Evans has grown into the Captain America role insanelly well. These actors and actresses aren't just there for a paycheck. In the final battle, you can see emotions flying off the screen.

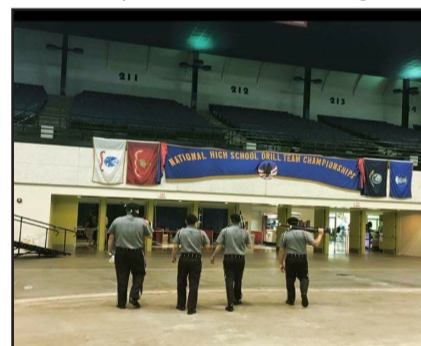
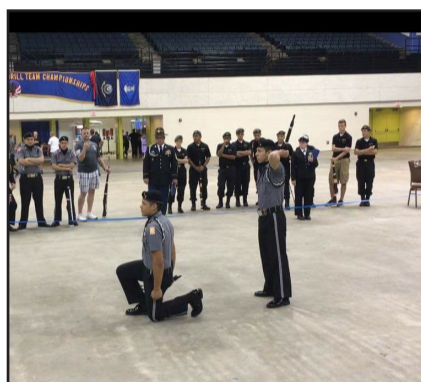
