NEWS Mr. Fitz's Journey By Karoline Mendez

Mr. Fitzgerald, known at Hubbard for teaching Law, has been recognized by CPS in their newsletter for his years of service at Hubbard. When asked how he felt about his recognition, he described it as "weird" "They don't seem to recognize many teachers. I'm not the oldest teacher in the system, but I'm known for being at one school the longest." Mr. Fitz started teaching at Hubbard in the fall of 1966 when Ms. Wiley, the current principal, was just a student here. Mr. Fitz says the only thing that has changed are student last names. Back then, 85% of students were Lithuanian. Now, 85% of the student population is Hispanic/Latino. "What changed is the language in the halls. Students use different languages so the teachers wouldn't understand what they are saying," he said. His Law II class has been acknowledged by the Board of Education as one of the finest in the city and has been filmed for the board's website.

Mr. Fitz was kind enough to share an interesting story from his 49 years of teaching here at Hubbard. In 2006, the Suave Company hosted The Suave Performance Plus Awards, which honors CPS high school teachers who go beyond their job requirements in and outside of school to make a difference in students' lives. The students were to both nominate and select the winning teacher. As part of the selection process, they were required to write an essay about their teacher which determined the finalists for the award. Mr. Fitz and another teacher were both finalists from Hubbard. While other teachers brought their friends, Mr. Fitz rented a limousine and brought the students who nominated him to the ceremony. As he sat on stage, he looked around at everyone else and thought to himself, "I'm not going to win this thing." He was given a bag of Suave products and as he was looking through it, they announced the winner. He heard all types of screaming and commotion coming from the students he had brought to the ceremony. The man sitting next to him nudged him and said "Aren't you Fitzgerald?" He nodded in confusion and the man exclaimed "Hey, you just won!" Taken by surprise, he got up and walked on stage to receive his award. "I got so excited I forgot to bring home my bag of goodies, but I had a great time", he said followed by a chuckle.

Mr. Fitz describes this memory as his biggest personal thrill. "The best kinds of things are when the people you teach appreciate what you're doing and think you deserve something," he said. "I'm the luckiest teacher in this building."

Dual Credit Classes - Year 2

Dual credit classes were first introduced at Hubbard last spring. Students who wished was delighted to speak about her class. to take the courses had to stay after school, compared to now where they are offered during school. This year students were given the opportunity to take not only the Math and Social Science classes that were offered last year, but an additional English class as well. Only 100 seats for the fall 2014 semester were reserved for the qualifying seniors with high ACT scores and juniors who were required to take the Compass exam. These students will receive both high school and college credit for passing the class if they pass with a C average or better. We spoke to the dual credit teachers and their students to get their input on the classes. Mr. Newman, assistant principal, became the liaison between Kennedy-King College and Hubbard High School. "Kennedy-King College is our partnering CCC school. The students will receive their credit from there, but that doesn't necessarily mean they have to go there," Mr. Newman said. "The college credit that the students are earning can be transferred to a four year university."

Mrs. Senlik, who teaches English 101, "This is my first year teaching dual credit, and I'm enjoying it so much," she said. She believes all her students will have English skills for when they go off to college. Dr. Nash, who holds a PhD in Anthropology, is more than qualified to teach dual credit. "You need a Master's degree or higher in the coinciding subject," he said. "I've been on the City Colleges of Chicago (CCC) staff for over 20 years now." Gabriel Cordova, Div. 503, who takes all three dual credit classes, said "The most challenging class for me is English because my teacher challenges my abilities." Jessica Dominguez, Div. 504, said "Math is the most challenging because the work level is more complicated than what I had anticipated it to be. Dual credit is going to help me in the long run because of the money and time I would save for college." Luis Calderon, Div. 507, also said "English 101 requires putting in a lot of time and effort. If you miss one day you'll be missing out on a lot. It truly is a taste of what college is going to be like."


Do you dare?
