## NEWS Chicago Teachers Strike

“Hey hey. Ho ho. Rahm Emanuel has got to go” was one of the more notable phrases that teachers chanted during their weeklong strike. On Monday, September 10th, approximately 26,000 Chicago Public School teachers picketed outside their schools as a result of failed contract negotiations between the Chicago Teacher’s Union and Chicago Public Schools. “Enough is enough,” said Karen Lewis, president of the CTU, and for the first time in 25 years, 350,000 students were out of school.

All around the city, teachers, staff members, school nurses, and even parents and students were picketing outside their schools and downtown at the Board of Education’s headquarters. All dressed in red and carrying picket signs, they chanted and demanded that their voice be heard about the remaining issues at the negotiation table. The issues were: classroom conditions, health benefits, teacher layoffs, and last but certainly not least, teacher evaluations.

For several days, the CTU and CPS were at odds, and the remarks against each other became more resentful by the day. Meanwhile, Mayor Rahm Emanuel’s patience was growing thin. Although he insisted that the negotiations be done at the table, parents all around the city were voicing their concerns about their kids not having a safe place to go during the day. This was a major inconvenience to many families across the city, especially ones with young children. Older students, however, leaned more towards the teachers’ side in this whole predicament. “I was definitely in favor of it,” Franco Landa, a senior at Hubbard High school commented. “I felt the reasons to strike were totally justified, and I was in agreement with them as well.”

On Sunday, September 16, CTU’s House of Delegates turned down their latest proposal. “They felt pressured,” Karen Lewis commented to the media. Therefore, they asked for more time and scheduled a second meeting on Tuesday. Rahm Emanuel, however, didn’t want to give them the extra time. On the following Monday, the mayor filed an injunction, asking a state court of law to end the strike and force teachers to go back to schools. Unfortunately for him, the court judge put it off until Wednesday. The need of an injunction was quickly put to rest when the CTU House of Delegates agreed to the proposed contract and ended the seven day teacher strike.

The Chicago Teacher’s Union strike motivated other school districts in the state of Illinois to start a strike of their own. Evergreen Park, Lake Forest, Highland Park, and Prairie Grove had to cancel classes due to a teacher strike when they disagreed with their own contract talks. On October 11th, 2012, Jean-Claude Brizard, Rahm Emanuel’s handpicked choice for CPS CEO, resigned by “mutual agreement”. He is to be permanently replaced by Barbara Byrd-Bennett.

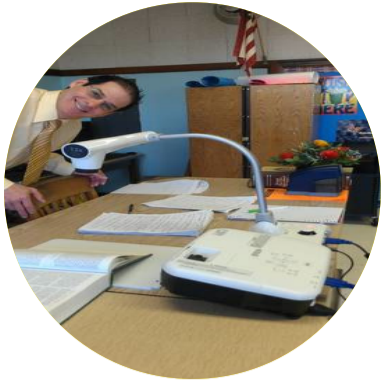
On Monday September 10, 2012, the Chicago Teachers Union (CTU) set out in hopes of getting a better contract to benefit everyone. Teachers all over the city either protested downtown at Market Place and at the CPS HQ, or they protested outside of their schools. Hubbard teachers stood on 63rd and Pulaski, in hopes of getting attention.

Many didn't know what teachers were striking for and the media played a huge role on the impact of the public. Misleading information made some people think that the strike was happening only to favor teachers but that was false. Teachers were fighting for better classroom conditions, updated books, more resources, smaller class sizes, and a fair raise. "We, as teachers, have been treated unfairly for so long that we let go of our rights. Last year we were not given the four percent raise and

our contracts weren't being respected. We simply cannot be bullied anymore," said Mr. Glascoff, an English teacher here at Hubbard High School.

While the strike was going on, an incredible amount of support was shown. Teachers were saluted by police officers, honked at in support, pedestrians applauded, students went out to chant with them, and the Hubbard band played loud and proud! Some teachers even barbequed for everyone! It was a truly positive atmosphere and a learning experience to stand up for what you believe in and not let anyone take away your rights.

Although the strike has been resolved, many teachers still feel that the fight is not over. You may have noticed that teachers wear red on Fridays. They do this to show union solidarity and to remain vigilant so that the strike of 2012 does not repeat itself.

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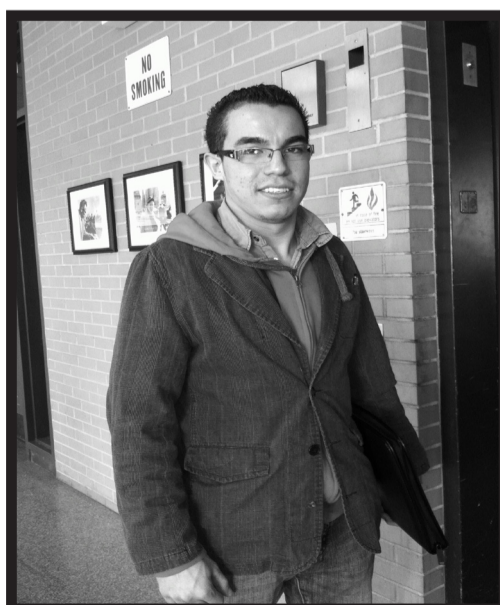

It has been four years since President Barack Obama was elected into office in 2008. Now, Obama faced another Republican candidate, former governor of Massachusetts, Mitt Romney. In 2008, after running a very close race against fellow Democrat Hillary Clinton, Obama was nominated as the democratic candidate for presidency. Later that year, he and vice-president Joe Biden won the elections against Republican John McCain and Sarah Palin, becoming the first African-American to be elected as President. Presently, Obama, along with Vice-President Biden are running for a second term in the 2012 elections.

Mitt Romney attended Stanford University and Brigham Young University. Unlike Obama, Romney started out his career in the business world. He worked as a Management Consultant at Boston Consulting Company, then later at Bain & Company. In 1984, Romney left Bain & Company to cofound the spin off investment firm, Bain Capital. In 1999, he was hired as President and CEO of the Salt Lake Organizing Committee for the Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games of 2002. In 2002, Romney was elected to be the Governor of Massachusetts. Mitt Romney won the Republican primary to run for President in the 2012 elections against current President Barack Obama.

The elections have come and gone. It's now up to President Obama to determine our course for the next four years of our country, but it could have easily been Mitt Romney at the helm. It might not seem like it, but every vote counts.

## Students Create Mini WALL-E

The Museum of Science and Industry is a great place to educate yourself and see amazing things, but did you know some of the things you see are built by students? I visited the museum and one of Hubbard's alumni, Jessica Almanza, Class of 2012, was my guide. She was a former member of the Center for the Advancement in Science Education at the museum. She started participating in the program four years ago, and she continued it throughout high school. She found the program beneficial and she stated that the program helps students with scholarships, financial aid, and choosing colleges.

Her senior year she began to experiment in the Fab Lab: a laboratory in which you build different robots and experiments. They design things in this laboratory using Google Sketch and then they build their design. Jessica and a few other students designed and made a robot model named WALL-E. The LCD screen on the arm displayed messages such as Welcome to MSI, I like Turtles and had smiley faces. Jessica and teammates worked hard on their model and when they presented it at the museum, people couldn't believe that students had built WALL-E.

Jessica introduced me to the Manager of the Fab Lab, Dan Meyer, whom I took the chance to interview. Dan Meyer has worked at the museum for a year and a half as manager of the Fab Lab, otherwise known as the Digital Fabrication Laboratory. It is based on a MIT class on how to make almost anything, and they have two of the machines there on which you can draw your design on the computer and the machine will follow the paths you draw on the computer to make the object. Dan says, "the best part about the Fab Lab is making things and teaching other people to make things." The Fab Lab was a great learning environment, and the program overall is amazing because it helps make science fun while giving students a sense of leadership.

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## Paranormal Activity 4 doesn't quite satisfy

In 2009, the horror movie franchise known as Paranormal Activity hit theaters with its first installment, Paranormal Activity. The series quickly became a hit, and has been releasing a follow up film for the past 3 years. The fourth installment of the movie series was set to be released on October 19, 2012. The story takes place 5 years after the events of the 2nd film. The film involves a lot of new cast members, as well as old members, such as Katie Featherston, Kathryn Newton, and Brady Allen, and was speculated to be a big hit amongst Paranormal Activity fans. As fate would have it, I got to see it early.

The first thing that I have to note about the film is the short run time. The Paranormal Activity movies usually have a shorter run time than a regular film's run time, and Paranormal Activity 4 is no different. With a run time of about 90 minutes, the film fails in building up rising action, making the final moments of the film feel rushed and hard to understand. The film feels more like a gimmick rather than an actual horror movie by trying to come up with random cheap scares and unnecessary reasons to record the whole house at all hours. The film attempts to build up for a 5th

sequel by making its ending vague and with a cliff hanger, but what it actually does is give you a feeling of disappointment. Personally, as a huge fan of the Paranormal Series, I did not enjoy this film as much as the other movies. The film doesn't really bring anything new to the series other than the usage of Xbox's Kinect Camera, which seemed pretty unnecessary throughout the entire movie.

I didn't enjoy the film as much as I wanted to. Unless you are a fan who wants a bit of closure from the third Paranormal Activity movie, I'd recommend that you avoid this movie. As a long term fan, I would give the film a 3/5, because it does answer some of the questions from the last three movies. However, for newcomers to the series, the highest rating I can give it would have to be a 2/5 due to the short run time, lack of answered questions, and the subpar acting. If you were to go see this film though, I highly suggest that you get a quick recap of the previous 3 films because previous knowledge of the films is necessary to understand what is actually going on.

Zap goes the lightning. "It's, it's... IT'S ALIVE!!!!" These words are famously quoted in the original Frankenstein movie as the doctor brings the monster to life. No, I am not doing a review on the original classic, but rather a family style homage to the monster movie of old. Originally made in 1984, the original Frankenweenie was the first live action short made by Tim Burton, but Disney deemed it to "inappropriate" and "un-child-friendly". It was later released on Video in 1994 and on special edition Video and DVD copies of "The Nightmare Before Christmas", along with a second animated short "Vincent". This full length movie is a remake and expansion of this short.

The movie takes place in the town of New Holland, presumably the 1950's. The story revolves around a boy named Vincent Frankenstein and his dog, Sparky. Unlike most kids his age, Vincent does not like to play sports, but rather prefers to make movies and perform science experiments. In an attempt to get Vincent out of the house, his father encourages him to join the town's little league team. It is then that his dog unfortunately gets loose and is hit by a car and dies. Later in school, Vincent learns how electricity can affect the nervous system to make it appear as if the body has re-animated. This inspires Vincent to bring Sparky back from the dead during a lightning storm, with successful results.

This happiness is short lived when one of Vincent's classmates learns of this and threatens to black mail Vincent unless he teaches him how to perform the morbid act. Going against his word, he tells the rest of their classmates and every single one of them brings back a deceased pet with the results ranging from comical to disturbing sins against nature.

Some things I would like to point out about this movie is the references to the original "Universal Monster" movies, which can be seen in the appearance of some characters, as well as the names used such as Frankenstein, VanHelsing and even the writing in of the name "Shelley" (Mary Shelley was the author of the original Frankenstein novel). In addition to the references to the classical monster movies, some parts were even taken straight out of the original Frankenweenie short. This movie continues with the traditional style of stop-motion-animation that Burton is famous for, and adds to the mood with its eerie black and white color. Even with these elements in play, it does stay at a child-appropriate level while still keeping jokes for adults and kids alike. Overall, while this movie was slow at times, it was still an entertaining movie regardless of age. My rating of the film is four and half stars out of five.



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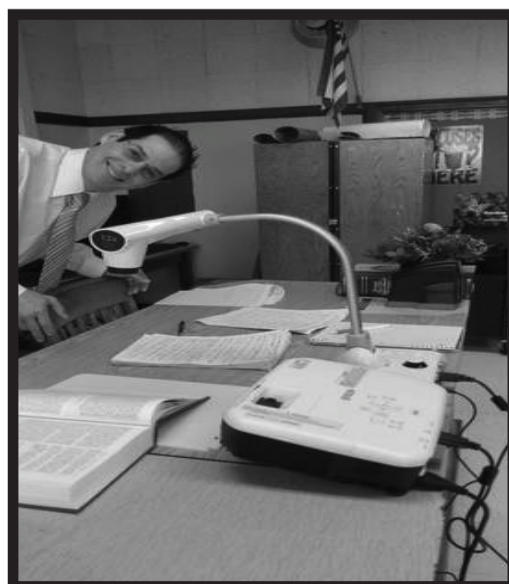
## P!NK

## The Wii U

Attention all video gamers, get ready because the Nintendo Wii U is almost here! Releasing on November 18, 2012, this console will be the first entry in the eighth generation of video game systems (Nintendo 3DS, PSP Vita). The Wii U was first revealed on June 7th, 2011 at the Electronic Entertainment Expo 2011. It will be released in two versions: the basic white version with 8GB of memory starting at \$299.99 and the premium black version with 32GB of memory at \$349.99.

The Wii U will feature two new controllers. One controller is called The Wii U Game Pad. This is the main controller for the Wii U. It has a built-in touch-screen. The second controller is called the Wii U Pro Controller. It's the second controller of the console available separately. The Pro Controller is like a traditional controller with dual analog sticks, buttons, and triggers.

French video game developer and publisher, Ubisoft, believes the Wii U can re-energize the console business. It also believes the system enables a completely new game experience. Ubisoft thinks the Wii U is trying to be 5 things: a regular system, the main console of home entertainment, and a social platform for games as well as a tablet, and a great experience for the game design generation.
