NEWS Hubbard GEARS UP for college

GEAR UP stands for Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs, and Hubbard High School was able to partner up with them to prepare students for college. The program is a federally funded and partnered with Northeastern University. The purpose of the program is to offer classroom workshops, tutoring programs, college visits, parental support, and professional development for teachers benefiting the whole Hubbard community.

Many of the tutors hired by GEAR UP are college students from the neighborhood. These tutors have worked

with some Hubbard students since elementary school and want to be accessible to all students and be mentors students can count on.

"I want the students to feel comfortable with asking questions and not be intimidated to say hi," said Carlos Munoz, GEAR UP tutor.

Carlos Munoz currently attends the University of Illinois at Urbana–Champaign and commutes more than 2 hours to work with Hubbard students.

Another tutor, Juana Ramirez, currently attends Harold Washington College. She wants Hubbard students to know that she understands what they're going through and is here to help. "I want them to see us as their own," said Juana Ramirez.

The college readiness workshops take place monthly and tutors are available during lunch and in some classrooms. Hubbard hopes this program will benefit the school by increasing college enrollment, scholarships, and graduation rates for students.

This cohort will continue for the next 3 years up until 2018. When the seniors graduate, the program will continue to support Hubbard graduates as they begin college.

"Students should take this opportunity for guidance. We hope to be partnered with GEAR UP for years. Hubbard High School is always looking for quality education," said Mr. Newman, assistant principal.



Open campus, no uniforms, and only two years of science and math to graduate. Does that sound like the good life? You would have to travel back to Hubbard during 1967 when Ms. Nancy Wiley, principal, was a freshman here at Hubbard.

During this era, Hubbard only had two wings, no girl's gym, and no pool. She had physical education class in what is now the ROTC drill hall. Most of the students were caucasian at the time which is contrary to the diversity we have now.

Ms. Wiley didn't begin her freshman year at Hubbard on the right foot. She managed to fail both Physical Education (P.E.) and Algebra.

"I think that was because of the transition between grammar school to high school because a lot of kids flounder a little bit," said Ms. Wiley. "It was a big change for me, so I didn't really apply myself until my junior year and then I started figuring it out."

It was in college that Ms. Wiley realized she loved math so she majored in it. After college, she caught a big break that would shape the rest of her career as an educator. "I needed a job and just happened to call here and I was thrilled when the old principal told me he had a position open as a teacher," said Ms. Wiley.

Ms. Wiley came back to Hubbard as a math teacher for 8 years and as a dean for 16 years. Ms. Wiley now works with some of the teachers that used to teach here when she was a student, like Mr. Fitz, as well as former students. "The best part of my job was talking to the kids and seeing them come back successful and seeing that their hard work paid off."

Ms. Wiley had no intentions of becoming principal, but her colleagues were supportive and talked her into taking the big chair. She has now been learning and teaching at Hubbard for 29 years.

The courses now are more rigorous and the students are required to have more credits in order to graduate. As someone who has spent much of her life at Hubbard, Ms. Wiley said she's never seen so many open collaborations between teachers and with students.

"I just want to tell the kids and the teachers thank you for making us a Level 1 school. We wouldn't be a level 1 if it wasn't for everyone doing what they're suppose to be doing." -The Top Greyhound, Ms. Wiley.





According to Assistant Principal Ms. Ishshah Phillips, CPS covered the cost for test takers who did not qualify for a waiver. The PSAT is not a college entry exam; students will still have to take the SAT or ACT during their junior year.

Many students thought the test was difficult and didn't have enough time to prepare and also had test anxiety. Students were given PSAT informational and practice test booklets.

"I felt very nervous, like the test was rushed because we didn't really have any time to get ready for it, so I wasn't prepared. I only had about two days to prepare in my college prep because my teacher gave me tips for the test that were very useful, but I still didn't feel certain that I was ready for it," said Alicia Mercado (Div. 710).

Some students were not happy about having to take yet another test in addition to REACH, PARCC, and ACT tests.

"When I was first told of the test, I was upset since we took the PARCC test last year, and I didn't want to deal with another test again since it wouldn't really count against us as a grade," said Giselle Garcia (Div. 805).

Hubbard decided to opt in because the EXPLORE and PLAN tests has been phased out as of last year.



The PSAT also gives students an opportunity for college readiness and scholarships.

"We thought it would be a good idea to give the exam so that we could have some base line data to know where our students are. We will then use that data to make improvements to ensure that our students are ready for college," said Ms. Phillips.

Good scores can lead to National Merit Scholarships and will help determine which AP courses students can take as well as prepare them for the SAT. The National Merit program provides a monetary award and can often be leveraged to secure additional scholarships. Students should take all tests seriously, even if it is not connected to a grade, because it may open doors to college.

"Visions of the End: A Review"



This is probably the worst novel I have ever read, and yet I highly recommend it to you, especially if you read and appreciated To Kill A Mockingbird and/or enjoyed the movie, which of course means you think of Atticus Finch as a demi-god of racial justice. This sequel of a sort faces us with a different Atticus, old and decidedly racist. It is not that Atticus turns out to be a racist that is so surprising and disturbing. It is that the last quarter of the novel is a spirited defense of his seemingly sudden turn to the right and that Scout, his daughter, seems to agree with him. Wrong-headed people make literature interesting, real. But writers who believe in their wrong-headed characters are dangerous. What happens to Atticus since the time of To Kill a Mockingbird is not all that uncommon in the South. My own father was a JFK Democrat in 1960, but by 1968 his car sport-

ed a George Wallace bumper sticker. What happened to him? I will let Atticus speak for him: "Do you want Negroes by the carload in our schools and churches and theaters? Do

you want them in our world?" Atticus does not think he is being racist when he says this. He genuinely believes that African-Americans should not live with whites. I have no problem with Atticus being a racist—he is what he is! My problem is that Harper Lee seems to share those sentiments. A good novelist, I would like to think, would see through Atticus and his arguments. Some people will think the Atticus of Watchman is not a fair portrayal of the Atticus of Mockingbird. I disagree. We only know that the Atticus of Mockingbird does not want a black man punished for a crime he did not commit. Doesn't that fact mean that he is not a racist? Hardly. Even racists can have a sense of justice.

I am less concerned with Atticus Finch than I am with his creator. Harper Lee chooses a biblical injunction as the title of her novel. "Go Set A Watchman" is a command to prepare for a coming invasion, an invasion of evil but also the coming of the Messiah who will rescue his followers from the said evil. Who is the Watchman? Yes, it is Atticus. To make matters worse, the white characters in the novel routinely refer to Robert Browning's poem "Childe Roland To The Dark Tower Came." In that poem the dark tower is the Moorish hordes invading from the South. Atticus and his kind are the Childe Roland. And they are visionaries. They envi



sion the end of an all-white world.

So why read this novel? Usually, we read to worship happily at the temple of vision and insight, but sometimes, as Miguel de Unamuno reminds us, we go to the temple to weep. In this case, we weep because Atticus Finch is very real and lives among us.




