A Dream: Challenged but Undeterred

Throughout Donald Trump's campaign, he was seen to rail against immigrants to the United States. This puts many at odds with his policies, especially those who are undocumented and in precarious positions already. Trump's use of threats, such as eliminating DACA, mass deportations and travel restrictions on refugees and green card holders, has sent many scrambling, anxious, and without a plan for the future.

But there is hope for those who are undocumented. Within days of the election, several immigrant advocacy groups stepped up to show support. There have been mass protests against his policies in cities around the world, most recently in airports during the recent travel ban.

Petitions have been filed for campuses to become "Sanctuary Campuses." This would essentially act as a new form of protection for them. A facet of a Sanctuary Campus is that the school will not allow ICE officers (U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement) on campus without a warrant or share information they possess on student status.

This new wave of policies stems from what are known as "Sanctuary Cities." Hundreds of US municipalities adhere to these policies, including Chicago. These cities shelter illegal immigrants either by de jure (by law) or de facto (by action). Hubbard High School has recently adopted a sanctuary status garnering support from a large hispanic population.

Donald Trump may or may not act on these policies. We can however, acknowledge that there is a growing opposition to his policies.

Alumni return for 2nd Annual College Fair

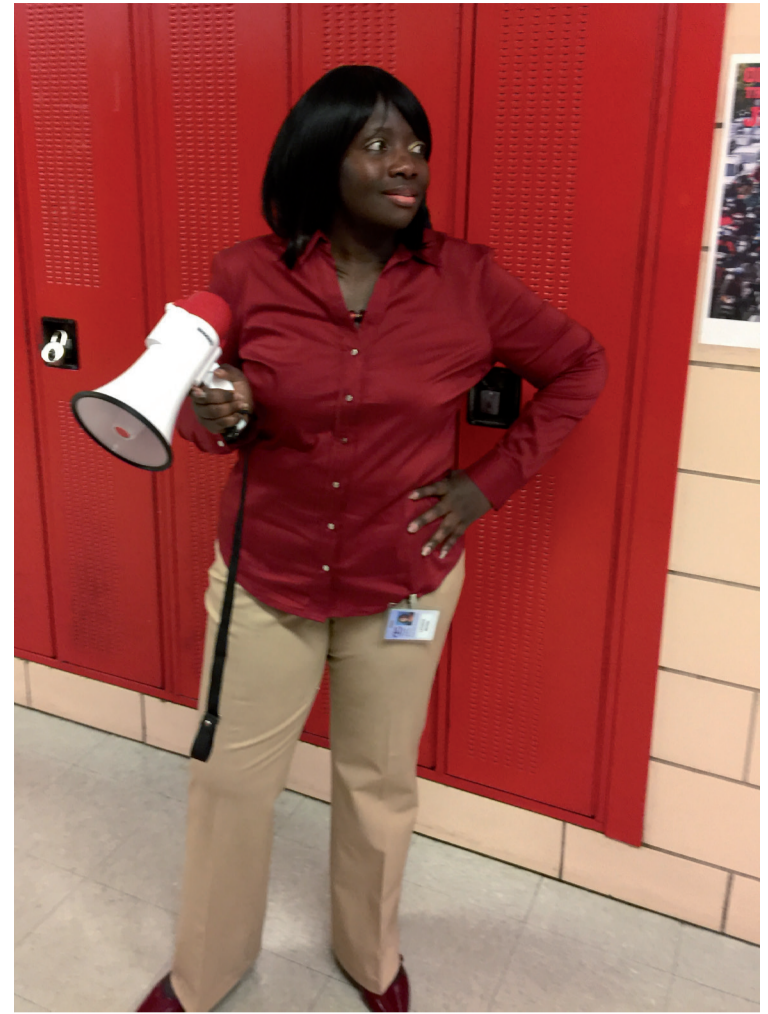

How do teachers feel about the sweeps? Mrs. Marfise said, "It is always the same group of students who are late."

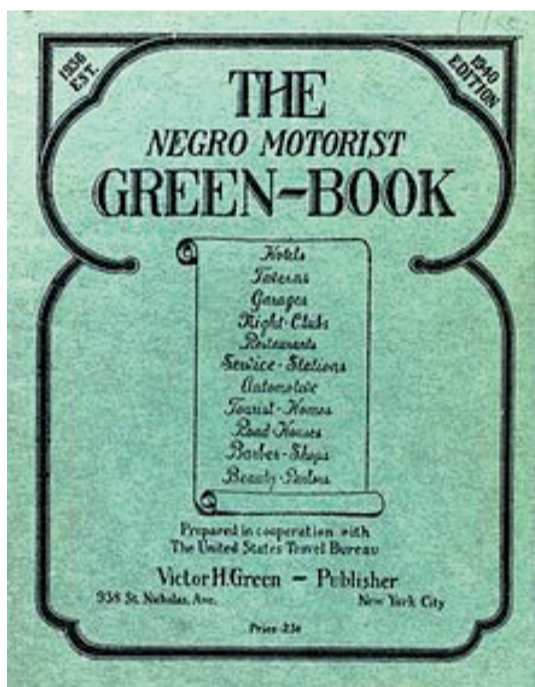
"Those who are late missed instructional time and tended to perform lower in the classroom. Without sweeps, the amount of students who have been tardy has increased," Mr. Biegel added.

The Green Book

African Americans have suffered through the horrifying struggle of racism and denial. During the traveling boom in the 20th century, many African American families migrated across the United States and soon realized that they were not welcome in many parts of the country. Some towns were too dangerous to enter for lodging or food, especially at night, due to a "whites only" policy. This was legitimized by Jim Crow laws which mandated "separate, but equal" segregation in many state and local laws.

According to library.sc.edu, a traveling guide called The Green Book was created by Victor H. Green who worked for the US Postal Service in New York. Green began the project by gathering data on stores that were "friendly" across the New York area and created the first issue in 1936. Eventually, he had gathered enough information to cover other states by using information gathered by postal workers and paid people who submitted tips about restaurants, hotels, gas stations, etc. The Green Book gained popularity and may have kept many travelers safe from harm.

African Americans were able to buy the Green-Book at gas stations to use as a guide for friendly and, more importantly, safe places to eat, fuel up, or spend the night.

School librarian, Ms. Wright wasn't aware of the Green Book. She said, "No, unfortunately, I did not know this book even existed, but the majority of the people, even teachers, don't know about it either. Maybe my friends know about it, but my parents did know the Green Book."

We found one teacher who recalled traveling during these segregated times, Ms. Terrell-Cox. She recalled traveling with her parents when she was 6-10 years old to Little Rock, Ak. She said her parents were aware of the Green Book as well but go most of their information through word of mouth.

"We were told there were 'Sundown Towns' where we were not welcome. [You] could not stop anywhere. You kept going, with enough gas to get past that area, stop maybe at Champaign to fuel, and get up north. Other people would know since they traveled, and their experience was spread through word of mouth."

The Green-Book lasted from 1936 to 1966. The Civil Rights Movement and the end of segregation soon rendered the book obsolete.

Through the use of his traveling guide, Green gained fame and could be called a Civil Rights activist by showing how African Americans can influence businesses, both black and white. Though the history of this book is not well known, as it has not been taught in public schools or mentioned in public media, we believe it's an important part of history that should not be forgotten as we celebrate Black History Month.

Obama's Legacy

Barack Hussein Obama, the United States of America's 44th president, accomplished much in these last eight years. While there are many accomplishments to list, I'll focus on what I view to be the most relevant to his legacy and why he will be remembered.

1 He ended the 2008 recession. In February 2009, Obama was able to convince Congress to approve a \$787 billion dollar economic stimulus package. This stimulus allowed for a myriad of improvements such as cutting taxes, funding public service projects, and extending benefits for the unemployed. This also allowed Obama to bail out the failing motor industry on March 30th, saving millions of jobs and forcing the industry into the competitive global markets.

2 His best-known act as president was the health care reform known as "Obamacare." The purpose of this bill was to staunch the rising cost of medical treatments. Medicare was losing its ability to pay for these as it could not handle the sheer influx of patients. Obamacare instituted preventative care to prevent costly visits to the emergency room. In 2014, around 95% percent of people were on some form of health insurance.

3 Oversaw the elimination of Osama Bin Laden followed by the withdrawing of troops from Afghanistan and Iraq. Seal team six (The United States Naval Special Warfare Development Group) attacked Bin Laden's compound in Pakistan on May 1, 2011. Obama ordered the slow removal of U.S troops later that year. Unfortunately, the rise of ISIS led the withdrawing to a halt and caused redeployments.

4 Obama reached a nuclear agreement with Iran: On July 14th, Obama brokered a historic nuclear deal with Iran. They would halt nuclear research in exchange for the lifting of the 2010 sanctions.

5 Negotiated the world's largest trade agreement: Obama, along with his team, negotiated the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP). If the plan passes through Congress, it stands to replace NAFTA as the world's largest trade agreement. Another plan in the works was the Transatlantic Trade and Investment (TTIP).

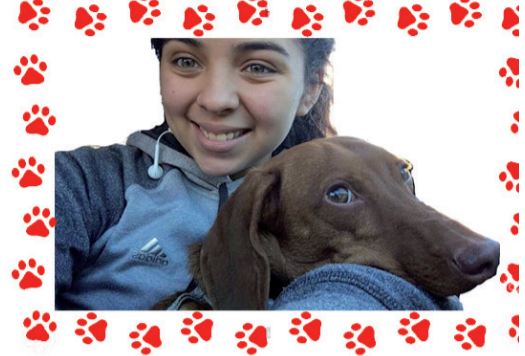

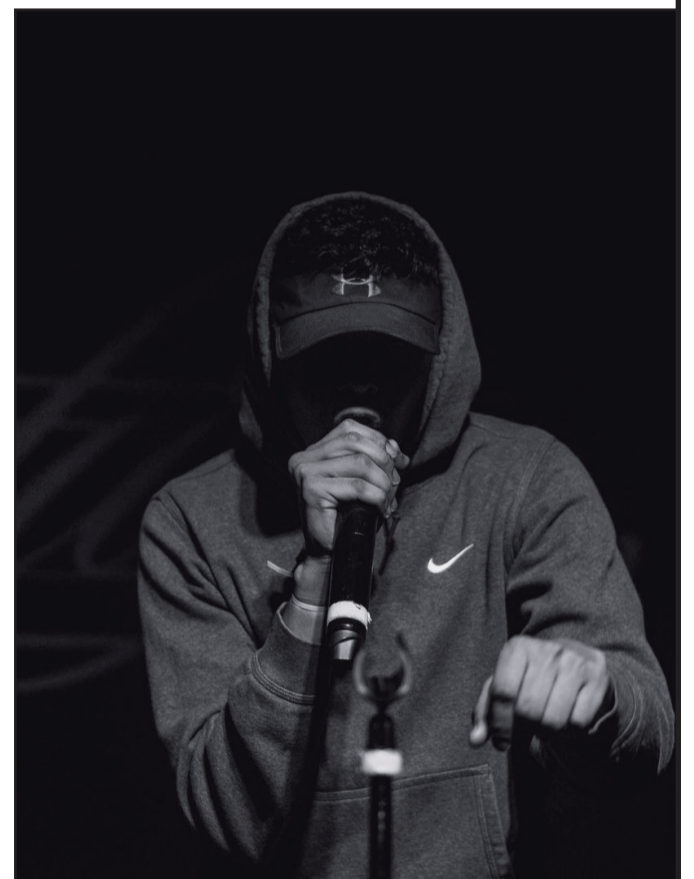

We have all used them at least once. They keep us hydrated, and refill our water bottles once they're empty. Last year, Hubbard's water fountains have gotten a huge upgrade. Bringing these water fountains to Hubbard was made possible by Mr. Ned Perisic, Larry (the engineer), and the administration.

Before the water fountains got an upgrade, they would dispense unfiltered water. Most students didn't use the fountains to fill water bottles because the pressure was too low and took too long. The filters, which remove 99% of impurities, are replaced during every winter, and summer break. According to Larry, "I drink more water from these filter's than a water bottle, because I know that it is being filtered."

Before students come in every morning, Larry inspects every water fountain. He is in charge of making sure that their status is in good standing which is indicated by the colors

green and yellow. Once the light changes to red, Larry changes the filter.

What about that water fountain with a flashing red light on the third floor? Well, that fountain already has a new filter. Larry says that it might be a broken sensor and is currently working on fixing the issue.

The hardest part of maintaining the water fountains is when students interfere with them. They place stickers on the sensors or stick gum on the water spout causing the water fountain to malfunction.

"We need to take care of these water fountains. Many schools are not as fortunate as Hubbard. CPS is making a lot of budget cuts, and if we don't care for them, there might be a time where we won't be able to fix the issue," warned Larry.

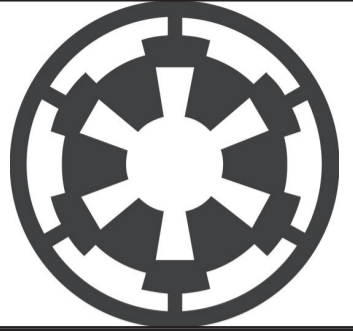

Rogue One: A Review

Rogue One: A Star Wars Story is an action packed Sci-Fi movie written by John Knoll and Gary Whitta. You’ll find tragic and humorous moments throughout the film. Rogue One is a prequel to Episode IV: A New Hope which takes place 30 to 40 years before The Force Awakens and a few weeks before the start of A New Hope. Rogue One features the most diverse cast of actors in the Star Wars franchise in a grittier film that takes inspiration from war movies like Saving Private Ryan and puts the war back in Star Wars. This departure from the traditional series is marked by the lack of the traditional scroll at the beginning. However, this isn’t your father’s Star Wars.

Felicity Jones is an Oscar nominee from the film The Theory of Everything. She is the second leading female actor to star in the Star Wars franchise. Felicity played a rebel soldier named Jyn Erson, the daughter of an important Imperial scientist. Her performance in the movie was amazing, almost as if she was born to play that role. Her character goes from that of unwilling hostage to hopeful leader.

Diego Luna, the first Latino actor to lead in any Star Wars film, played Cassian Jeron Andor, a captain of the Rebellion army. Diego Luna may be best known for one of his first roles in the film Y Tu Mama Tambien which put him on the map as an exceptional actor. Diego Luna’s performance was remarkable because he didn’t hide his Mexican accent which inspired many Latinos with his role in Rogue One.

Others actors rounding out the crew include Donnie Yen playing a blind monk that believes in the Force, Chirrut Imwe, and Jiang Wen as Baze Malbus. Riz Ahmed (Nightcrawler) does a good job playing the defecting Imperial pilot, Bohdi Rook. The scene stealing and crowd favorite droid, K-2SO, is played by Alan Tudyk. Forest Whitaker plays Saw Gerrera, a character first introduced in the animated series The Clone

Wars and Rebels. Scenes showing his connection to Jyn seems to have been cut, leaving a vague connection and a wheezing performance that was ultimately disappointing. If you look carefully, there are many easter eggs referencing characters or ships from the animated series.

Among all the many spectacular things the movie had to offer, the one that stood out was the CGI (computer-generated imagery). Rogue One resurrected two important characters from Star Wars: A New Hope, which was released in 1977. Using a mix of a stand-in actor and special effects, actor Peter Cushing, who died in 1994, was revived as Grand Moff Tarkin. Grand Moff Tarkin’s role as the commanding officer of the Death Star made it necessary that his presence (or lack of) in Rogue One would have been a glaring plot hole. Although many might find it unethical to cast dead actors, the CGI was well done with the permission of Peter Cushing’s estate and Carrie Fisher’s approval before she suddenly passed away.

Even though the movie had many robust qualities, it infamously had issues that needed a script rewrite and extensive reshoots. This changes can be felt as some characters feel underdeveloped and some scenes abrupt. The soundtrack also lacks the soaring flair that John Williams brought.

Rogue One is a divergence from the usual Star Wars films that we’re all familiar with. The CGI used in Rogue One was impressively well done, and it is safe to say that they have changed the game forever. In addition to the Visual Special Effects (VFX) used in the film, the movie also included a diverse cast that was missing in previous films. The diversity was a breath of fresh air for many fans and supporters of the Star Wars franchise.

The ending of the movie was also different than from any other; it had a dark twist which many didn’t think Disney would allow, given their penchant for happy endings. The main protagonist’s companion droid K-2SO had a darker edge to him than the droids we are used to. Finally, Darth Vader returns with a vengeance with James Earl Jones once again voicing the galactic tyrant.

However, the movie wasn’t with flaws. While it didn’t hinder the plot, having too many characters made it hard to remember the names, and the lack of a backstory also made the viewers care less about the characters. In addition, the film begins 30 or 40 years before The Force Awakens which confused new fans about when the movie takes place. Lastly, it’s pretty obvious how the movie ends for old fans since we’re told in the opening crawl of Star Wars: A New Hope. We give it 4 out of 5 stars.

Apple introduces new MacBook Pro with Touch Bar

Apple’s new 2016 lineup marked new expectations for Apple as they redesigned their MacBook Pro line. The MacBook Pro now features the new integrated Touch Bar and Touch ID, USB-C ports only, and upgraded stereo speakers.

Luckily, I had the opportunity to unbox the brand new MacBook. Out of the box, the frame shines in its sleek, space gray color. Compared to the 2009 model the new pro is way slimmer at .59 of an inch and feels incredibly light at only 3.09 pounds.

At start up, the Retina LED screen warmly welcomes you and promptly asks if you would like to set up touch ID, which serves as confirmation to log

in to the computer as well as for apps and purchases.

The Macbook also features a dual core i5 processor clocked at 2.93 GHz and decided to put it up to the test. I opened up iMovies, one game, a video, and two websites, and as expected, it held up pretty well transitioning between each application smoothly with 8 gigabytes of DDR3 memory in hand.

However, the much beloved Magsafe, which disconnects the power cord in case someone trips over it, doesn’t make an appearance this year nor does it look like it will in the future. It has been replaced by the all new USB-C. Apple decided to make this bold move of compressing the laptop into a small light weight device at the cost of removing all utility ports.

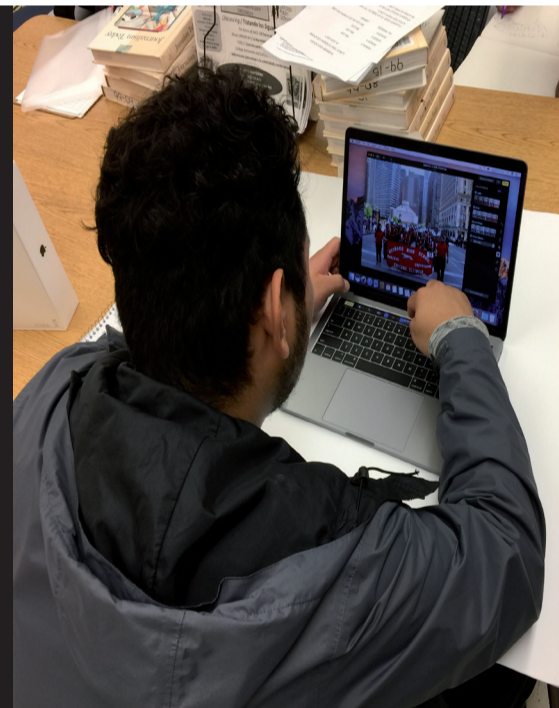
The all new Touch Bar brings a whole different experience into the Apple world. This “Touch” Bar is a OLED strip that allows programmable access to websites and apps and replaces the laptop’s function keys. The performance of the bar is smooth and lightning fast which gives users more precision when scrubbing through videos. Apps already preinstalled take advantage of the bar. iMovies takes full advantage of this bar. You give up the trackpad for one tap options and easy editing and precise time in seconds.

The trackpad is almost the size of an iPhone 7+ and has force touch which allows for more options in manipulating photos and apps. The speak-

ers are much louder than previous Macbooks with bass and high tones that are very clear. The keyboard takes some getting use to because it feels shallow and is very loud when typing, but it’s not bad. The best part is the screen which is bright and colorful.

While the experience of this laptop was phenomenal, for the price, I do not recommend buying the new MacBook Pro. The whopping entry price for a 13 Inch without the touch bar is \$1,499. The Macbook Pro Touch Bar may be redesigned and integrated with future iOS updates. However, as it is, the Touch Bar is not useful enough for everyday use. Apple has recently announced a new chipset, Kaby Lake rumored to be released the third quarter of this year and a lower price on the entry model. If you’re looking to upgrade, I recommend you wait.

½ grated parmesan
Minced fresh parsley

Step 1: Boil water for the pasta and have it ready.

Step 2: In a large skillet over medium heat, melt the butter. Add in the olive oil along with the garlic and onions. Cook until onions are translucent (3-4 minutes).

Step 3: Add the shrimp, then stir and cook for a couple of minutes. Squeeze in the lemons.

Add the wine and hot sauce (again, these ingredients are optional), salt and pepper. Stir and reduce the heat to low.

Step 4: Throw the angel hair into the boiling water. Cook until just al dente.

Step 5: Drain. Remove the skillet from the heat. Add the pasta and toss. Taste for seasoning, adding salt and pepper if needed. Top with grated Parmesan and minced parsley. Serve immediately.
